

EasyLink features are based on the "one touch operation" approach. This means that a sequence of actions are executed at the same time in both the television and the recorder, provided both are fitted with the EasyLink function and connected with the eurocable supplied with your recorder.



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Safety warnings



Do not insert the power plug in a wall socket or hang the TV to the wall before all connections are made.

• Wall mounting instructions/Table stand/Motorised swivel How to mount the supplied stand and/or wall mount bracket and the swivel, see the supplied separate Quick Start Guide.

Caution: Installing the TV requires special skills that should only be performed by qualified personnel. You should not attempt to do the work yourself. Philips bears no responsibility for improper mounting or mounting that results in accident or injury.

Using the supplied bracket to mount the TV:

- You can ask a qualified service personnel about using the bracket to mount the display on the wall.
- Follow the instructions that come with the bracket before beginning work.
- Make sure that the wall mount is being fixed securely enough so that it meets safety standards. The weight of the TV (excl. packaging) is about 42 kg.
- Place or hang the TV wherever you want, but make sure that air can circulate freely through the ventilation slots. Do not install the TV in a confined space such as a book case or a similar unit. To prevent any unsafe situations, no naked flame sources, such as lighted

candles, should be placed in the vicinity. Avoid heat, direct sunlight and exposure to rain or water.

The equipment shall not be exposed to dripping or splashing.

Make your connections **1** Insert the aerial plug firmly into the aerial socket $\neg \neg$ at the bottom of the \odot TV. For best picture quality use the suppressor-aerial cable supplied. 2 Before installing your TV, connect all your peripheral equipment. B Insert the mains cord supplied into the mains at the bottom of the TV and in the wall socket having a mains voltage of 198-264V. (-) To prevent damaging the power (AC) cord which could cause a fire or electric shock, do not place the TV on the cord. UK - EIRE **Remote control** Insert the 2 batteries supplied (Type R6-1,5V). Switch the TV on

Press the power switch (\bigcup) at the top of the TV. An indicator on the front of the TV lights up and the screen comes on. If the TV is in standby mode, press the **-P+** keys or the (\bigcup) key on the remote control.

First time installation

The first time (and only the first time) you switch on your set, you see an installation introduction screen. The **installation procedure** consists of a series of screens that guide you through the process.

• After an introduction screen, you are asked to select a language of the TV's on-screen-menus. (The text of the header and the info on screen continuously change language.)

2 Press the cursor up/down to highlight your language.

3 Press the **OK** key.

4 Follow the instructions on screen to proceed.

Note: Once you completed the initial installation procedure, you may access the screens from the Settings menu. See p. 8.

To operate the motorised swivel



The motorised swivel can turn + and - 30 degrees and can be operated with the remote control of your TV. Manual rotation remains possible too.

Preparation

- Insert the DC cable of the swivel transformer into the DC input of the swivel.
- 2 Insert the power cord to the swivel transformer.
- 3 Insert the mains plug of the swivel transformer in the wall socket.

Operation

First press the **SWIVEL MOT** key at the side of your remote control and keep it pressed.


- Then simultaneously:
- press the cursor left/right to rotate the swivel in the direction of the command;
- press the the cursor down to bring the swivel in a central position;
- press the cursor up to return the swivel to the last selected position.

Note: After a power drop or a power cord plug out, adjust the swivel position with the cursor left/right.

Automatic positioning to central position

Press the () key for at least 5 seconds to switch off your TV and to turn the swivel to its central position.

Keys at the top of the TV



Should your remote be lost or broken you can still change some of the basic settings with the keys on the top of your TV. Press the power switch $\binom{1}{2}$ to switch the TV on.

Press:

- the ⊿ or + keys to adjust the volume;
- the P/CH or + keys to select the TV channels or sources.

The $\ensuremath{\textbf{MENU}}$ key can be used to summon the Settings menu without the remote control.

Use:

- the \checkmark and + keys and the **P/CH** \checkmark and **P/CH** \blacktriangle keys to select menu items;
- the **MENU** key to confirm your selection.

Note:

When activated via the **MENU** key on top of the TV, only **Exit** lets you dismiss the menu.

Navigate to Exit, press the cursor right and then press the MENU key.

Care of the screen

Do not touch, push or rub or strike the screen with anything hard as this may scratch, mar or damage the screen permanently. And please do not rub with dust clothes with chemical treatment.

Do not touch the surface with bare hands or greasy cloth (some cosmetics are detrimental to the screen).

Unplug the TV before cleaning the screen.

When the surface becomes dusty, please wipe gently with absorbent cotton or other soft materials like chamois soaks.


Do not use acetone, toluene and alcohol because they cause chemical damage.


Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners.

Wipe off saliva or water drops as soon as possible. Their long time contact with the screen causes deformations and colour fading.

Use of the remote control RC4310

Note: For most keys pressing a key once will activate the function. Pressing a second time will de-activate it. When a key enables multiple options, a small list will be shown. Press repeatedly to select the next item in the list. The list will be removed automatically after 6 seconds or press **OK** to remove immediately.





12 Dual screen/PIP

Press the 12 key to switch on or off Dual screen or PIP, according to the format selection made in the **PIP format** list in the Setup, Preferences/Picture/sound preferences menu, p. 11.

PIP allows you to call up a subscreen within the main screen enabling you to watch two TV channels or a TV channel and pictures from a peripheral at the same time.

Dual screen allows you to divide the main screen into two subscreens enabling two TV channels or a TV channel and an external source or a combination of one of them with Teletext (see p. 21) to be watched simultaneously.

Note: Not all combinations might be possible. In such a case a message appears on the screen.

- Press the cursor left/right to highlight the PIP window or the left/right screen in Dual screen
- Press the -P+ key or the -E key or the digit keys in order to change TV channels, external sources or teletext pages in the highlighted screen. Note: on screen information, which appears when changing channels, always

refers to the highlighted screen.
Press the 12 key again to return to a full main screen picture. The TV tunes to the picture which was highlighted in the Dual screen or PIP mode. Notes:


- Audio only plays from the main, when PIP has been selected, or from the left screen, when Dual screen has been selected.
- When in Dual screen, two display formats are supported: full screen or squeezed.
- Multimedia browser content will always be displayed full screen.
- When PIP or Dual screen mode is activated, and a TV channel or source is locked, the picture is grayed out.

Define the position of the PIP screen

- **1** Press the cursor right to highlight the PIP screen.
- **2** Press the red colour key on the remote control to select Position. Note: If no action has been undertaken, the function bar at the bottom of the screen will disappear after a few seconds. Press any colour key to make it re-appear.
- 3 Use the cursor keys to define the position of the PIP screen.

Picture format


Press this key repeatedly to select another picture format: Auto format, Super zoom, 4:3, Movie Expand 14:9, Movie Expand 16:9, Subtitle zoom or Wide screen.




Auto format makes the picture fill the screen as much as possible. In case of subtitles in the bottom black bar, Auto format makes the subtitles visible. In case of a broadcaster logo in the corner of the top black bar, the logo disappears from the screen.

Super zoom removes the black bars on the sides of 4:3 programmes with minimal distortion.

When in Movie Expand 14:9, Movie Expand 16:9, Super zoom or Subtitle zoom picture format, you can make subtitles visible with the cursor up/down. Note: With HD sources not all screen formats will be available.



Access and view multimedia content from memory devices and from your PC



The Browse screen (and the underlying Multimedia content browser) is intended to contain all content, applications you are interested to consume. If you want to connect your TV to a PC or home network, see the supplied separate Connected Planet guide for further explanation of this functionality.

- **()** Press the $\bigcirc \mathcal{N}$ key to activate.
- Press the cursor up/down to move the highlight up and down in the list of menu items.
- 3 Press the cursor right to go deeper into the structure.
- Television:

• Multimedia:



How to navigate through the Settings menus

The Settings menu allows you to access and change settings and preferences.

- Press the **MENU** key on the remote control to summon the Settings menu.
- On the left panel the highlight can be set on a menu item with the cursor up/down.

The right panel shows the content of the highlighted menu item in the left panel.

Note: Sometimes not all the menu items are visible on the screen. Use the cursor down to reveal all items.

- Use the cursor right to enter the right panel.

The content of the right panel is moved to the left panel and the right panel shows the content of the newly highlighted item in the left panel. Note: In some cases it is important that the picture can be watched while adjusting the settings. This means that when the highlight is on the right side panel, the other menu items hide away. When cursor left is pressed again, the hidden menu items re-appear and the highlight moves to the left panel.

- Press the cursor left to go one menu level up again.
- Press the **OK** key on the highlighted item to activate and to dismiss the menu.
- Press the **MENU** key again to exit the Settings menu.
- Note: The menu is also dismissed by pressing one of the colour keys (if present) referring to certain actions which may be executed.


The **Demo** menu allows the user to get an idea of the features that are part of the television.

- **1** Select **Demo** in the Settings menu and press the cursor right.
- 2 Highlight a desired demo with cursor up/down.

Select the menu language and country

- **1** Press the **MENU** key on the remote control.

Store TV channels

After language and country are set correctly, you can now search for and store the TV channels in two different ways: using Automatic Installation or Manual Installation (tuning-in channel by channel, see further).

Automatic installation

- Select Automatic installation in the Installation menu. Note: All channels must be unlocked in order to autoprogram. If requested, enter your code to unlock all channels. (See TV, Features menu, Childlock, p. 17.)
- Press the cursor right to enter the Automatic installation. The autoprogramming option label Start now appears.
- B Press the OK key.
- Press the green key Start to start autoprogramming. The menu screen disappears and the progress of autoprogramming is displayed.

If a cable system or a TV channel which broadcasts ACI (Automatic Channel Installation) is detected, a programme list appears. Without ACI broadcast, the channels are numbered according your language and country selection. You can use Reshuffle to renumber them. See p. 9.

Manual installation

- **1** Select Manual installation in the Installation menu.
- 2 Use the cursor right to enter the Manual installation menu.
- B Select Selection mode.

Select either the frequency band, the C-channel option for aerial channels or the S-channel option for cable channels.

- Press the cursor down to select System. Select your country or part of the world where you are now located.
- Press the cursor down to select Channel. Enter or select the number where you would like to store the TV channel.
- Press the cursor down to select Search. The frequency or the C- or S-channel number increases until the TV channel is found.

Note: If you know the frequency, the *C*- or *S*-channel number, enter the 3 or 2 digits of the frequency or the channel number directly with the digit keys 0 to 9 (e.g. 048).

Press the cursor down to select Fine tune. Adjust the frequency with the cursor up/down in case of poor reception of the channel found.

Press the cursor down to select Store.Press the cursor right and store the channel found with the OK key.

Repeat steps **(5)** to **(8)** to search for another TV channel.

It is possible that the cable company or the TV channel displays a broadcast selection menu. Layout and items are defined by the cable company or the TV channel. Make your choice with the cursor and press the **OK** key.

Reshuffle/Rename channels

If your amplifier or receiver has a matching connector for Digital Audio In, you can connect it with a single cable to the TV's **DIGITAL AUDIO OUT**.

- Press the cursor right to select **Picture**.
- 2 Press the cursor right again to enter the Picture menu.

Personalisation tool

The **Personalisation tool** helps you to come to a personal picture setting. This is done by presenting a series of several adjustment screens each having split screens. Each time you have to select the most preferred side of the screen. Finally a full screen appears with all the settings selected.

Note: The Personalisation tool will not alter the presence of behaviour of other picture setting options, except that it overwrites the Personal settings of Smart picture.

Smart picture

Note: This Philips TV has been set at the factory to look best in bright shop environments which typically use fluorescent lighting. As your home will likely not be as well lit as a shop, we recommend that you cycle through the various smart picture modes to find the one that best suits your own viewing conditions. Most consumers will find that **Natural** is the correct choice.

Contrast

This will adjust the intensity of bright parts in the picture but keep the dark parts unchanged.

Brightness

This will adjust the light output of the complete picture, which will mainly affect the darker areas of the picture.

Colour

This will adjust the saturation level of the colours to suit your personal preference.

Sharpness

This will adjust the sharpness of fine details in the picture.

Tint

This will increase or decrease **Warm** (red) and **Cool** (blue) colours to suit personal preferences.

Select **Cool** to give the white colours a blue, **Normal** to give the white colours a neutral, **Warm** to give the white colours a red tint.

Digital options

Pixel Plus 2 is the most ideal setting, as it fully processes the image to make every single pixel the best it can be, improving contrast, sharpness, picture depth, and colour reproduction and brilliance from every source, including High Definition.

For the most optimum motion reproduction of all source materials, select the **Movie Plus** setting.

Standard mode is recommended only for very noisy or poorly mastered sources or for those who find the smoothness of Pixel Plus 2 unsettling.

Dynamic contrast

Automatically makes the contrast in the darker and the brighter picture areas more noticeable as the image on the screen changes. Normally select **Medium**. It may be preferred to select **Minimum**, **Maximum** or **Off**.

- 1 Press the cursor right to enter the list.
- 2 Select one of the settings with cursor up/down.
- B Press the cursor left to return to the picture menu.

DNR (Digital Noise Reduction)

Automatically filters out and reduces the image noise and improves picture quality when receiving weak video signals.

- Select Off, Minimum, Medium or Maximum according to the image noise.
- 3 Press the cursor left to return to the picture menu.

Colour enhancement

When activated, this feature automatically controls green enhancement and blue stretch. It makes the colours more vivid.

Hue

This compensates for the colour variations in NTSC encoded transmissions.

Picture format

This menu item performs the same as the key on the remote control. See Use of the remote control, p. 5.

Active Control

The TV continuously measures and corrects all incoming signals in order to provide the best picture possible.

It also uses a sensor which monitors the ambient light conditions in the room and adjusts key picture settings for best viewing.

When Active Control is set to Maximum, the brightness, the contrast and the colour of the Ambilight shall be influenced by the light sensor. When Active Control is set to Medium, only the colour of the Ambilight shall be influenced.

This controls the level of sound through the headphones.

Surround mode

This selects the modes for more spatial or surround sound reproduction dependent on the broadcast signals or signals from external inputs received.

Dual I/II

This will select, per channel, Language I or Language II, when dual sound transmission is available.

Mono/Stereo

This selects, per TV channel, Mono or Stereo sound when analog stereo broadcasts are available.

AVL (Automatic Volume Leveler)

This automatically reduces the volume differences between channels and programmes, providing a more constant overall level. This will also reduce the dynamics of sound.

Delta volume

This allows you to correct for any permanent volume differences between TV channels or external sources.

Smart colour modes:

- **Personal**: Select any colour or hue to match to your personal taste, e.g. your interior, the programme content (sports, movie, etc.), the mood you are in, etc.
- Warm white: The colour is matched to that of most normal lightbulbs. Select this setting if you want the Ambilight to fit best with normal living room lighting.
- Cool white: The colour is matched to that of normal daylight (6500K). Select this setting if you prefer more cool lighting.
 Note: the 6500 K is the SMPTE recommended setting for ambient backlighting of displays.
- Blue: The blue colour is preferred by most consumers to create a cool, modern and /or mystical atmosphere. Select this setting according to your personal taste or mood.

Ambilight menu

Ambilight is an innovative lighting concept using light with fully adjustable colours at the back of the TV to enhance the viewing experience. Analysis of the picture content adapts the colours continuously, or the lights can be set to any fixed colour and many shades of white. Ambilight creates the ideal viewing environment for your TV resulting in improved relaxed viewing, improved perceived picture detail, contrast and colour.

In standby mode the lights can be set/operated to any colour and create a unique ambiance in the room.

- Select Ambilight in the TV menu.
- **2** Press the cursor right to enter the Ambilight menu.
- 3 Select Ambilight and press the cursor right to select Off or On.
 - Off: will switch off the ambient lights and downlight all other ambilight menu items.
 - **On**: the ambient lights will be on. Refine the light settings in the menus below.
- 4 Select Brightness to adjust the light output of the ambient lights.


Ambilight in Standby mode

The Multimedia browser lets you display pictures and/or movies or play audio files stored on a USB device or a memory card.

The Multimedia browser application is invoked from the Browse menu (press the OJ key) by selecting a device and pressing the cursor right.

Your TV is also equipped with the possibility to connect to your computer or home network and to access and view your personal multimedia files. See the supplied separate Connected Planet guide for further explanation of this functionality.







Most TV channels broadcast information via teletext. This TV has a 1200 pages memory that will store most broadcasted pages and subpages to reduce waiting time. After each programme change, the memory is refreshed.

Switch Teletext on and off

Decoder and Recorder

Connect a eurocable ④ to your decoder and to the special euroconnector of your recorder. See also the recorder handbook. See Decoder, p. 13. You can also connect your decoder directly to **EXT1** or **2** with a eurocable.

- Your TV supports HDCP (High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection). This is a system for protecting DVD content outputted via DVI from being copied. It provides a secure digital link between a video source (DVD, PC, etc.) and your TV. Content is encrypted at the source peripheral equipment to prevent unauthorised copies from being made.
- Proper working is only guaranteed with HDMI compliant consumer products.
- Digital peripheral equipments from different manufacturers have the possibility of differing output standards which may cause difficulties for the television to properly display.

In case no signal is detected from your HDMI equipment, switch off the HDMI equipment and then on again.
 To get an optimal viewing, it is advised to switch your DVD player to one of the following TV display standards: 1920x1080i, 1280x720p, 720x576i, 720x576p, 720x480i, 720x480p.

Connect your equipment to the DVI connector of your TV ①. According to the type of connector of your equipment, you may have to use an appropriate adapter.

DVD


Connect the DVI to DVI cable to the **DVI** connector of your TV (1).

Computer (PC):

- with a DVI connector: connect the DVI to DVI cable to the **DVI** connector of your TV .
- with a VGA connector: connect the VGA cable to a VGA to DVI adapter ④ and connect to the **DVI** connector of your TV ①.
- Connect the audio cable (2) to the DVI AUDIO R (right) and L (left) inputs of the TV when the TV expects analogue audio for a connected peripheral equipment to come from an analogue audio input

OR

Connect the audio cable (3) to one of the **DIGITAL AUDIO IN** connectors of the TV when the TV expects digital audio for a connected peripheral equipment to come from a digital audio input. Then also make your selection of the source to which the peripheral equipment with digital audio input has been connected in the Setup, Source menu. See Digital audio, p. 13.




Personal computer to the home network connector

Record with your recorder



- Record a TV programme with your recorder without EasyLink
 - You can record a TV programme using your recorders tuner without affecting your TV.
- 1 Select the channel number on your recorder.
- Set your recorder to record.
 See the handbook for your recorder.

Switching channel numbers on your TV does not disturb recording !

• Record a TV programme with your recorder with EasyLink

In TV mode, it is possible to start a direct recording of the programme which is being displayed on the TV screen.

Continue to press the ${\ensuremath{\, \bullet \,}}$ key on the remote control for more than 2 seconds.

Notes:

- Switching programme numbers on your TV does not disturb recording.
- When recording a programme from a peripheral connected to **EXT1**, **EXT3**, **EXT4** or **Side**, you can not select another TV programme on the screen without disturbing the recording.
- If your EasyLink recorder has the system standby function, when you press the Wey for 3 seconds, both the TV and the recorder are switched to standby.
- If you have connected an S-VHS recorder provided with the EasyLink function, you can record S-VHS quality from an S-VHS peripheral connected to the left side of the TV. (E.g. from an S-VHS camcorder.)

To select connected equipment



- Press the
 key and then press this key repeatedly or select Source in the Settings menu (see p. 13) to select EXT1, EXT2, EXT3, EXT4, DVI, HDMI, Side or TV, according to where you connected your peripheral equipments.
- 2 Press the cursor up/down.

Normal mode

 for rewind (VCR, CD); search down (DVD)
 for stop,
 for play,
- ► for fast forward (VCR, CD); search up (DVD)
- i+ to display information
- MENU to switch the menu on or off
- P + for chapter, channel, track selection

- 0 to 9 digit entry, cursor up/down
- to select the next or the previous disc (**CD**) cursor left/right to select the previous or following track (**CD**)
- P•P to select a DVD title/chapter; index (AUX)
- to select your choice of subtitle language (DVD)

Notes:

- If no action is being undertaken within 60 seconds, the remote control returns to TV mode.
- After an action in the selected system mode, the remote control will remain in this mode for 60 seconds and will then return to TV mode or press the SELECT key to return to TV mode immediately.

Expert mode

When you do not want the remote to go back to TV mode, and to stay in the mode selected, proceed as follows:

- **1** Select **TV** mode with the **SELECT** key.
- **2** Press the **SELECT** key again simultaneously with the **OK** key for at least 2 seconds.

Direct selection of a connected peripheral equipment

When the remote is in **TV Expert mode** you may directly select a connected equipment in the following way:

Press:

- The key followed by digit '1' to select the device connected to EXT1.
- The key followed by digit '2' to select the device connected to EXT2.
- The key followed by digit '3' to select the device connected to EXT3.

Setting the remote control to work peripheral equipment

Your TV remote control gives you the opportunity to control all your peripheral equipments with one single remote control. This can be done by selecting the correct brand and type out of the list of Direct Entry codes for peripheral equipments.

Press the **SELECT** key repeatedly to select **DVD/R**, **SAT**, **VCR** or **AUX** according to the peripheral equipment you want to operate with this remote control. See Use of the Remote control, p. 4. If the function keys on the remote control also work the selected peripheral equipment, then the remote is ready and no further steps are needed.

If the function keys do not work with the selected peripheral equipment, according to the equipment(s) you own, you may make your remote control ready for them by a direct entry code. Proceed as following.



Code setup

- Press the **SELECT** key repeatedly to select your source according to the peripheral equipment you want to operate with this remote control.
- Press the SELECT and () key at the same time for longer than 4 seconds. The selected mode LED will lit constantly.
- Input the 3-digit code for the type and brand of peripheral equipment. The codes are listed on page 33.
- The selected mode LED will blink fast for 5 seconds as a confirmation you entered a correct code. The remote will go back to the last selected mode. If you entered a wrong code the mode LED will stay on for 2 seconds. Redo step 3.
- S Now you will try to use the TV remote with the peripheral equipment. Press the **SELECT** key repeatedly to select the desired mode. The selected mode LED will stay on for 2 seconds and then begin blinking. The blinking means that the remote is in the external mode you have selected.
- Within 60 seconds from the time the blinking starts, point the remote toward the peripheral equipment and press the ⁽¹⁾/₍₂₎ key. If the peripheral equipment does not respond to the ⁽¹⁾/₍₂₎ command, follow the steps for programming the remote again using a different setup code for the type and brand of peripheral equipment you wish to operate. Refer again to the code list on page 33. If no more codes are listed for the type and brand of external equipment, the remote likely will not operate your particular model of peripheral equipment.

Notes:

- Your TV remote is not necessarily capable of being programmed to operate all models of the brands of peripheral equipments listed on page 33. You may want to try the programming process again. Try using the number(s) that are listed for your type and brand of peripheral equipment to be sure you did not make a mistake in inputting the digits during your first attempt at programming.
- If the remote control is in one of the external modes (a mode light is flashing) DVD/R, SAT, VCR or AUX and you don't press any of the remote keys for sixty seconds, a "time-out" occurs, returning the remote to TV mode.

To cancel the selected mode

Press the **SELECT** key for 2 seconds. The remote control will return to TV mode.



Learnable remote control

Your TV remote control supports a learnable function which makes it possible to read out codes coming from another remote control from equipment from another brand.

This makes it possible to use only one remote control to control all your other connected peripheral equipment. For the following equipment the highlighted keys are programmable.

Note: You can put whatever function of your other device remote under one of the highlighted keys.



Press the SELECT key of your TV remote control repeatedly to select your destination source (e.g. DVD, VCR,...).

2 Press the **OK** key and the () key simultaneously for at least 4 seconds.

- The LED of the selected source on your TV remote control will light up constantly.
- Press a valid destination key on your TV remote control under which you want to copy a certain function from the remote control of the selected external equipment.
- If Place both remote controls face to face so that the infrared signals can be exchanged.
- Press for about 2 seconds on the remote control of your external device the function key you want to be learned by your TV remote control.

The LED of the selected source on your TV remote control is blanked during the capture of the signal. When the function is copied, the LED is lit again.

6 Repeat steps 8 to 9 again to copy other functions.

7 To exit the learnable mode:

Press the key at the side of your TV remote control for about 2 seconds. Your remote control will remain the last selected mode.

Note: If a code from the remote control of your external equipment is not recognised by the TV remote control, the LED of the selected source will blink for a few seconds. This means that the code transfer did not succeed.

To put the remote control function keys back to the factory mode

- **1** Press the **SELECT** key repeatedly to select **TV** mode.
- Press the OK key and the K key simultaneously for at least 5 seconds. All the SELECT LEDS will light up.
- Press the SELECT key
 - 1x: DVD/R is lit up
 - 2x: SAT is lit up
 - 3x: VCR is lit up
 - 4x: AUX is lit up
 - 5x: DVD/R, SAT, VCR, AUX are lit up.
- Press the OK key when one or all mode LEDS are lit.

The function keys which were 'learned' will be erased or from the selected destination source or from all the external equipment at once. All the keys from the TV remote control will have their factory function again.

Tips

Symptoms	Items to Check and Actions to follow
Poor Picture	 Have you selected the correct TV system in the manual installation menu? Is your TV or house aerial located too close to loudspeakers, non-earthed audio equipment or neon lights, etc.? Mountains or high buildings can cause double pictures or ghost images. Sometimes you can improve the picture quality by changing the direction of the aerial. Is the picture or teletext unrecognisable? Check if you have entered the correct frequency. See Installation, Manual installation, p. 8.
No Picture	 Are the supplied cables connected properly ? (The aerial cable to the TV, the other aerial to your recorder, the power cables.) Has the child lock been switched off ? In case of weak or bad signal, consult your dealer. Check if you selected the correct source.
No photo, music or video play or in poor quality only	• Check if the source complies with a supported code.
Digital distortion	 The low quality of some digital picture material may be the cause of digital image distortion. In this case select the Soft setting using the Picture menu, Smart Picture, without changing the picture settings manually. Select Digital STB in the Source menu (p. 13) to automatically switch to the Soft setting.
No sound	 No sound on any channel? Check the volume isn't at minimum. Is the sound interrupted with the mute key ix?
Good sound but poor colour or no picture	 Adjust the contrast, colour, tint and brightness setting. Try another smart picture setting.
No solution found for your picture or sound problem ?	Switch your TV off and then on again once. Never attempt to repair a defective TV yourself. Check with your dealer or call a TV technician.
Remote control	 Check if the remote control is in the correct mode. If your TV no longer responds to the remote control, the batteries may be dead. You can still use the MENU key and the -/+ keys on top of your TV.
Standby	Your TV consumes energy in the standby mode. Energy consumption contributes to air and water pollution. Power consumption: < 1 W
No stable or not synchronised VGA picture	 Check if you have selected the correct VGA mode in your PC. See HDMI connector, p. 28.
Control of peripheral equipment	The infrared signals of the screen may influence the reception sensibility of other peripherals Solution: replace the batteries of the remote control of other peripheral equipment. E.g. keep away a wireless headphone from within a radius of 1 meter.
Motorised swivel	Objects between the remote control and the remote control swivel may prevent proper operation. See p. 3.
Miscellaneous	See Extras, Specifications on this CD.



Kensington Security Slot (if present)

Your TV is equipped with a Kensington Security Slot, to prevent it from getting stolen. An anti-theft Kensington lock has to be

purchased separately. The Kensington lock is a plastic-coated steel cable with a lock. One end has to be fixed to the opening of the TV and locked with a special key. The other end is attached to a fixed point.

Note: Only FAT/DOS-formatted portable memory is supported.



Automatic software upgrade procedure

Manual software upgrade procedure

Introduction

This document explains how to make a Philips slideshow file with background audio. Be aware that the content of this document is addressing technical or software skilled users. To start the slideshow open the slideshow file in the Multimedia browser of your TV.

- Press the Ø♪ key on the remote control after having inserted a memory card or USB device and switched on the TV.
- 2 Go to where you stored the slideshow file (.alb) on your portable memory.
- 3 Select the slideshow file and press the OK key to start the slide show.
- ④ To stop a slide show, press the key.

General Rules

- The slideshow will use plain ASCII XML syntax to allow the creation and editing of the slideshow files using simple tools.
- All references to network content must be based on the global address of the content.
- Content on a Portable Memory (PM) doesn't have a global address; as a result content from a PM can never be referenced from a slideshow not stored on the PM itself.
- To maintain portability, a slideshow stored on a PM should ONLY reference content on the same PM. Referencing global addresses can result in inconsistencies if the PM is used on a non-networked CE device. The latter is however not forbidden, it is only a recommendation.
- It is preferable that URL's referencing PM content are based on a relative path starting from the directory where the slideshow is stored. This path includes the device or drive name of the PM.
- An absolute path to content will also be supported.
- relative path: pictures\test1.jpg, tamper.jpg, ..\new\bird.jpg, ...
- absolute path: USB1:\pictures1\foo_bar.jpg, C:\f1.jpg, \organization.jpg, ...

 - SmartMedia Card (SM)
 - MultiMedia Card (MMC)
- XD cards are supported through an external XD compatible card reader (not supplied with the TV) connected to the USB connector. The same holds for other future memory cards.
- Do not apply excessive force when inserting a memory card into the digital media reader. If the memory card doesn't fit or isn't detected by the TV, try to flip over the card and re-insert it.
- When inserting multiple cards at the same time some card combinations will work. It is however recommended to insert maximum one memory card at the same time.

Digital Camera Issues

If a USB connection between your digital camera and the TV isn't working, you can try the solutions below to resolve your problem.

- Make sure your digital camera is switched on and verify if the configuration of your digital camera is correct (see the manual of your digital camera for more information).
- Some digital cameras allow you to switch off the USB interface. Make sure that the USB interface is switched on before connecting to the TV.
- Remove the memory card from your digital camera and insert it directly into the digital media reader on the right side of your TV.
- If you have a digital camera with only internal memory (no removable memory) you can try to copy the content manually to a memory card or a USB memory device using a personal computer.
- Some digital cameras allow you to switch between PTP (Picture Transfer Protocol) or "PC Link" and USB Mass Storage or "PC Drive". Make sure that you select USB Mass Storage or "PC Drive" on your digital camera.
- If your camera supports different interface settings be sure to try them one by one or contact the reseller of your camera to find out the correct setting.

USB Memory Device Issues

- Devices connected to the USB port of your TV must be "Mass Storage Class" compliant. If your device (digital camera. MP3 player, portable harddisk, ...) is not "Mass Storage Class" compliant it will not be detected by the content browser of the TV.







Always try to reduce the number of wireless connections. You will in most cases not be able to stream video if both PC and TV are connected wireless to the network.

To avoid implementation problems we recommend using a Wireless Access Point device (e.g. Philips CPWBS054) in combination with a wireless Ethernet bridge (also called a "Game adapter").

Wireless devices use a wireless protocol to communicate by means of radio waves.Wireless radio waves travel outwards from the antenna in all directions, and can transmit through walls and floors. Wireless radio waves can theoretically reach up to 100 meters in an open environment. Practically it could be less than 10 meters depending on the type of walls and floors in your home and other environmental conditions.The content playback quality will depend on the wireless signal quality and the connection type.

Notes:

- It is recommended to buy a Wireless Access Point supporting 802.11 a/b/g or b/g. The a-type devices are ideal for transferring good video quality and the g-type devices are sufficient for good audio quality. The b-type devices are not suitable for good video streaming.
- Do not use an ad-hoc wireless connection (TV-PC) as it limits your bandwidth.



- Obsconnect your wireless Ethernet bridge from the PC and connect it to the NETWORK connection at the bottom of your TV.



Annex 2 : Wireless network security

Attention

Since wireless computer networks use radio signals, it is possible for other wireless network devices outside your immediate area to pick up the wireless signals and either connect to your network or to capture the network traffic.

Consult the user manual supplied with your wireless Access point or wireless Ethernet bridge for further information.

DO

- Viruses, spyware and other malicious programs can undermine the security of your network. Use the appropriate software to protect your PC from these threats.
- Change the default passwords for your network devices. Leaving these at default makes it easy for an outsider to gain access.

Note: If you change passwords, write them down and store them in a safe location.

- Use a router or a Wireless Access Point with Network Address Translation (NAT) or a firewall.
- In a wireless network, enable the highest WEP key level that your hardware provides for. Upgrade your hardware, if possible. If you do not protect your wireless network, all data from your PC might be accessible to, for example, your neighbours or passers-by.
- Switch off SSID broadcast on the Wireless Access Point.
- Position your Wireless Access Point away from windows and towards the centre of your home.
 This decreases the strenght of the signal outside your home.
- Some access points can control access based on the unique MAC address of the network devices trying to connect to it. See the documentation of your network devices to retrieve the MAC addresses.

For the MAC address of your TV, see Annex 3, Manual Network Installation, View Network settings, p.13.

DON'T

- Don't rely on radio transmission range limitations to secure your network.
- Don't use WEP/WPA keys and passwords that are easy to guess.
- Don't use passphrases to secure your wireless network as incompatibility with other brands of wireless network devices may occur.

View network settings

This will display the current values of the network parameters associated with the network.

Network mode

This allows you to select your network configuration mode.

Choose **DHCP & Auto IP** for automatic network configuration by your router or wireless access point (preferred).

Choose **Static IP** for manually entering a static network configuration. Proceed with IP configuration.

IP configuration

This allows you to enter your IP configuration settings if you selected Static IP in the Network mode menu:

- IP address: you are prompted to enter a fixed IP address that the TV will use in your network. Preferably choose one from the range: 192.168.0.xxx or 192.168.123.xxx or 10.0.0.xxx
- **Subnet mask**: you are prompted to enter the subnet mask address of your network. Enter the same subnet mask throughout your network, e.g. 225.225.255.0

DHCP/Auto IP or automatic network addressing is a protocol used to automatically connect network devices to a network. Please, refer to your router or wireless access point's hardware instructions to see if this is supported.

Static (or fixed) IP address: This is an IP address that your TV will always use to connect to your home network. When DHCP/Auto IP is not available, you can set a static IP address on your TV.

A **Subnet mask** is used to define a subnet which is separated from all other networks by a router. The subnet mask indicates which part of the IP address is on the local network, and which must go out through the router.

Annex 5 : Supported file formats

A codec (encoder/decoder) is a technology for compressing and decompressing data. Codecs convert digital signals to and from analog, and can be implemented in software, hardware, or a combination of both. Standard codecs are used to encode and compress audio and video data for streaming across networks.

Glossary

Access point: This is a wireless device that is often added to a wired network to enable wireless operation. It can also be used in an ad-hoc network configuration.

Ad-Hoc network: A direct network connection between two devices (two PCs, or a PC and a TV).

DHCP: Refers to Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol used by many routers to automatically connect computers to the network. Please, refer to your router or gateway hardware instructions to see if this is supported.

The router acts as a DHCP server. This server allocates IP addresses, netmasks, and the gateway address to all DHCP client computers and devices in the network automatically.

DNS: The Domain Name System is a distributed Internet directory service. DNS is used mostly to translate between domain names and IP addresses, and to control e-mail delivery.

DivX 4, DivX 5, XviD: a digital video compression format based on the MPEG-4 technology, used mainly for downloadable movies on the Internet.

Ethernet: Ethernet is a well-established local area networking standard, and is incorporated into (or available for) most computers.

Firewall: A firewall acts as a barrier that helps protect your network from intruders from the Internet. The firewall specifies what information can be communicated from the computers on your network to the Internet, and from the Internet to the computers on your network.

Gateway: The address of the upper device that has a connection to the Internet.

A Gateway router is a network component that attaches to your cable or ADSL modem. It allows multiple computers or other devices to be connected together and to share the same broadband Internet connection. (A wireless router is required for wireless connection.)

Home network: A network is a wired or wireless connection between two or more devices. Home networks allow you to connect computers together to share files and an Internet connection.

IP address: Internet Protocol. The language by which systems inter-communicate over the Internet, each system having a unique "IP Address" by which it may be identified.

IP addresses uniquely identify every network or host on the Internet. Every computer in a network has a unique IP address.

MAC address: (Media Access Control address) Each device (e.g. PC Ethernet card, router, wireless Ethernet adapter, ...) that can be connected to a network has a unique hardware address.

MP3:A popular standard audio compression format used on the Internet. Most commonly used to play audio on computer.

MP3 Pro: A newer MP3 format. Offers an improvement in compressed sound quality.

MPEG 4: standard for audio/video compression, with higher compression rate than MPEG 2.

Netmask: A netmask is used to define a sub-net which is separated from all other networks by a router. The netmask indicates which part of the IP address is on the local network, and which must go out through the router.

PC Link: PC Link is a feature that enables you to transfer music, picture or movie files from the computer(s) on your home network to your TV. You need to install the Philips Media Manager software to use PC Link.

Philips Media Manager: The software you need to install and have active on your PC to be able to access music, pictures and video on your PC.

PMM: Philips Media Manager.

Router: A device that does the interconnecting of networks. Its job is to coordinate and filter traffic between the networks. (E.g. your home network and the Internet)

SSID: The name of your wireless network. Stream: A transmission of music or video that is played instantly and not stored locally.

WEP: Designates a type of wireless encrytion.

WiFi: The international leading industry standard for wireless broadband networking. Also called IEEE 802.11.

Wireless access point: This is a wireless device that is often added to a wired network to enable wireless operation. It can also be used in a ad-hoc network configuration.
